

UPDATE: Hearing Loss Seminar in Western Colorado

The kick off meeting for the Western Colorado Chapter is planned for Saturday, November 6. The chapter organizers were fortunate to connect with the Center for Independence in Grand Junction, which sponsored the meeting in conjunction with the Colorado State HLAA organization. The Center provides services at no charge for people with disabilities who need help living independently.

The meeting was billed as *Maintaining your Independence: A Seminar for People with Hearing Loss*.

At press time, about 50 people had signed up to attend the free seminar. The special guest speaker will be Dr Verner Johnson, who has been a Geology professor at Mesa State College since 1976. He also had a hearing loss at birth, is oral and read lips, and wears hearing aids.

We will also have Denice Roberts, an Assistive Technology Specialist with the University of Colorado, give a demonstration and display of various assistive devices for people with hearing loss.

In addition, Amy Beckett and Robin Taber will present an overview of HLAA and the benefits of starting a chapter in Western Colorado. Lunch will be included with the seminar with an opportunity for the attendees to meet and socialize.

The first regular meeting of the Western Colorado chapter is tentatively planned for December 4. This will be a social and planning meeting at a site and time to be determined.

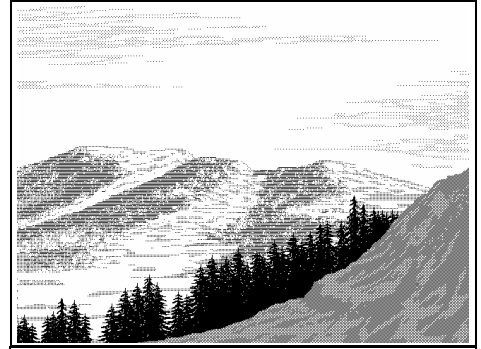
Joyce Arrington (far right in blue) speaks on Lip Reading at the October 16th Boulder Chapter meeting.

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Deafness can lead to divorce

The hard-of-hearing partner often feels upset that their spouse does not understand what it is like to suffer from the condition, the poll found. But the deaf person's reluctance to recognise their condition and do anything about it is also a major source of stress. A third of respondents to the study, which questioned more than 1000 people with deafness over 40, said their inability to hear properly had led to arguments with the family. And one in 16 said their partner had even threatened to leave or divorce them unless they got their hearing sorted out.

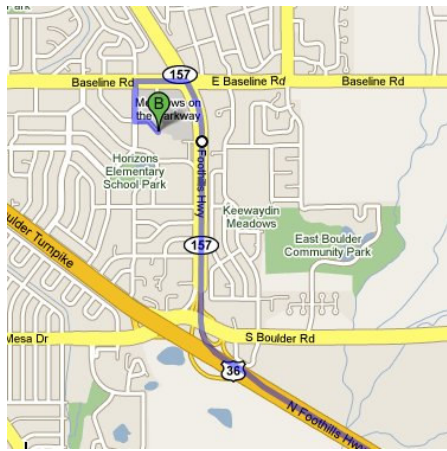
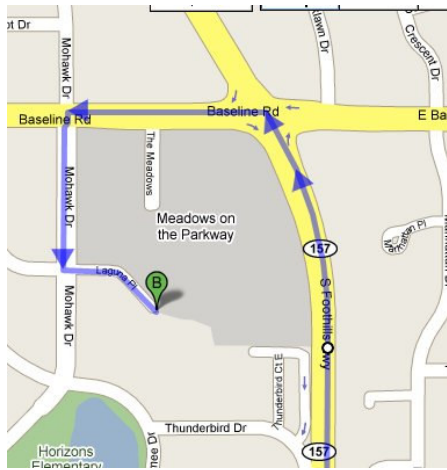

Mohney's Musings

As I write this I'm waiting for Trick-or-Treaters on Halloween. It's getting dark earlier and earlier, which means the nights are getting longer.

I replaced my smoke alarm this week with a new alarm that emits intermittent tones. I also bought a *Lifetone* Fire Alarm with a bed shaker. It recognizes the tones from the smoke alarm to set off the bed shaker. It has a lower tone, and a light. It also has an alarm clock to uses the bed shaker, so I was able to replace my alarm clock as well. As a bonus, my smoke alarm on the ceiling also has a light.

How many of you think about various devices that might be helpful to you in your home? Hearing aid compatible telephones were one of the first devices that were available to us, and over the years there have been many more devices, some that even help people that can hear. Captioning on television is one.

This month there was a new act signed into law on October 8, 2010, the *21st Century Communications and Video Accessibility Act of 2010*. It comes on the heels of the 20th Anniversary of the Americans with Disabilities Act. Hearing Loss Association of America worked with COAT (Coalition of Organizations for Accessible Technology) to move this new bill forward. Under this law, if a television program was published or exhibited on television with closed captions, any time that programming is shown later on the internet, it must include closed captions.

Telephones used with the internet must be hearing aid compatible. It allocates up to \$10 million per year

from the Interstate Relay Service Fund for equipment used by individuals who are deaf-blind. It restores FCC rules requiring video description, devices designed to receive or play back video programming using a picture screen of any size be capable of displaying closed captioning, and more.

When we talk about advocacy and the achievements, we should remember that Hearing Loss Association of America has blazed a large trail for those of us who benefit from all of the technology and advancements that have taken place over the last 30 or so years. Hearing Loss Association of America is able to do the work they do and represent those of us with hearing loss because of members.

If you are not a dues paying member of HLAA, please consider spending the \$35 a year it costs to become a member. This is less than \$3 a month, and less than 10 cents a day. In return you get the *Hearing Loss Magazine* 6 times a year. The magazine alone is a wealth of information about hearing loss and all of the amazing advancements being made on our behalf.

There are local chapters that offer support, education, and social activities. There are chat rooms and message boards to use online 24/7.

The annual convention is a wonderful, educational experience that you have to attend to fully realize how powerful it really is. There are also discounts available from Harris Communications, Teltex, ClearSounds, and Hitec if you shop with them for your technology needs. Avis also offers a discount on car rentals.

Speaking of the convention, the 2011 HLAA convention will be in Crystal City, VA just outside of Washington, DC. June 16 – 19th, 2011, followed by the 2nd International Hearing Loop Conference.

The Keynote speaker will be Chris Artinian, one of the brothers in the Artinian family that was featured in the Oscar-nominated film *Sound and Fury*. Chris and his wife decided to have a cochlear implant for their son, while Chris' brother, Peter, and his wife weren't ready for their three deaf children to have the procedure.

This year's Research Symposium is sponsored by The Deafness Research Foundation and will be *The Impact of Noise on Hearing*. Registration information will be online in the near future at www.hearingloss.org, and look for the *convention* link.

My Experiences at the HLAA 2010 Leadership Seminar and on Life with Hearing Loss

What does Hearing Loss Association of America offer you? "Why should I join yet another organization that might require my time, energy, money, or concentration? I've been getting along just fine as I am ... what about you? Excuse me. What? What did you say? Please repeat that? Uh huh, huh. Hmmm, well? Yes? Oh, ah, hmm, hmmm, mmm."

Have you ever bluffed your way through a conversation or a meeting, a class or church service, or just wished you knew why everyone else at the table was laughing? Do you know someone with hearing loss who tries hard to participate in a group discussion, but also gets frustrated at the same time?

Hearing Loss Association of America (HLAA) is a national organization with local chapters that offers information, support, education and advocacy to people with hearing loss. HLAA's message is this: "Hearing loss is a daily challenge you can overcome. You do not have to hide your hearing loss (and) you do not have to face your hearing loss alone."

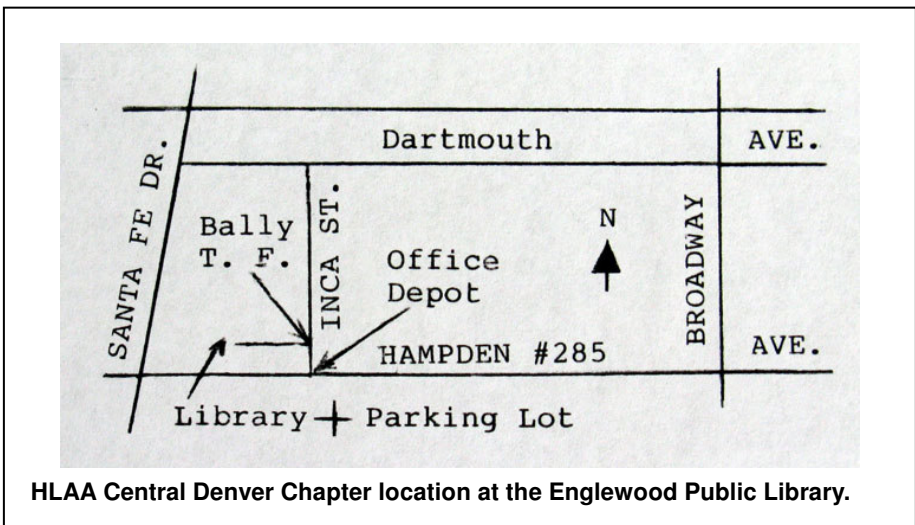
I just returned as a chapter coordinator candidate from HLAA's 2010 leadership seminar in Washington D.C., and I am very excited about the personal encouragement and professional support that HLAA offers to everyone affected by hearing loss. It was VERY refreshing and inspiring to me to spend time with other people who did NOT resort to mumbling and saying hmmm, uh huh, or nodding politely, and who also did NOT allow ME to get frustrated or to pretend that I understood! Instead, all 23 of us at this meeting were able to see and hear the speakers clearly; to read along with written, real-time captions; and to participate equally. What an encouraging experience!

I first discovered HLAA last November, while searching online for information about my own hearing loss, and I have already learned SO much from the *Hearing Loss Magazine*, from HLAA's website, and from the other members I met last weekend at HLAA's national

office in Bethesda, Maryland. Every person with hearing loss has a unique story as to when their hearing loss began, and how it has affected them and their families and friends. In turn, HLAA offers valuable information about assistive technology, including hearing aids and cochlear implants; legislative proceedings (i.e. landline and cell phone captioning, TV and movie captioning, and insurance coverage issues); and most of all, personal encouragement.

I have been profoundly deaf for 45 years, but did not really know anyone else who is hearing impaired (except my own parents, who are losing their hearing as they get older) until I joined HLAA. For all those years, living in a world of silence was just the way it was, and I managed to adapt. However, when two of my children became teenagers and began bombarding our home with increasing amounts of radio, TV, music, MP3s, iPods, fast conversations, and so on, I began to feel increasingly isolated, invisible, and frustrated. Meeting other people with hearing loss who understand and who have found positive solutions has been very encouraging.

Once I discovered the wealth of information and resources available through HLAA to help me personally, then I in turn volunteered to help start a new HLAA chapter in western Colorado.



Did you know that 17% of all Americans have a hearing loss? That hearing loss is one of the top medical concerns for today's military veterans? That there are many different causes and types of hearing loss, and it is definitely not just an "old-people's" problem? That you or someone you know do NOT have to pretend to understand a conversation or movie or telephone call? Last weekend's leadership seminar was just a taste of the multitude of people and resources available to help each of us make the best of our hearing loss. In short, HLAA is well-worth my time and energy, and yours!

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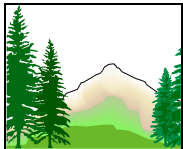
Disabilities Act Imposes New Obligations on Broadcasters

On October 8, 2010, the President signed into law ("enactment") the "Twenty-First Century Communications and Video Accessibility Act of 2010" ("Act"). This legislation requires a number of communications industry sectors- including television broadcasting-as well as consumer electronics to make their

systems and services accessible to persons with disabilities. Among other things, the Act requires broadcasters, video programmers, video distributors, consumer electronics manufacturers and others to ensure that persons with disabilities can access communications, entertainment and media services. The legislation imposes new responsibilities on TV broadcasters with respect to video descriptions and closed captioning of Internet video content as well as initiates an FCC process that will likely result in additional obligations regarding the accessibility of emergency information delivered to viewers.
