



Western Colorado Chapter Update -- December 2010

The fledgling Western Colorado chapter of HLAA had a very successful second meeting with 15 attendees on Saturday, December 4th, 2010 at the Center for Independence, 740 Gunnison Avenue, Grand Junction, Colorado.

Amy Beckett opened the meeting with an opportunity for attendees to introduce themselves, and explained that HLAA is a national organization with local chapters that offer information, education, advocacy and support to people with all types of hearing loss. Every chapter meeting offers an opportunity to meet other people who share and understand hearing loss, plus information about different coping strategies and assistive technologies, and updates on national issues such as hearing aid tax credits, insurance coverage, and captioning.

There was an electronic audio-loop to amplify Amy's voice directly to attendees' hearing aids that were equipped with T-coils and a PowerPoint outline of Amy's talk, plus Robin Taber wrote notes on a white board during the meeting at the front of the room. For the January 2011 meeting, we also plan to provide live captioning projected on the wall from a laptop computer.

Next, Amy gave a live demonstration of captioned telephones, which can be a huge help for people who miss parts of phone conversations. Sprint CapTel offers 3 types of captioned phones - a landline version, an internet service that works off your computer screen, and a cell-phone service. The group was small enough to have some open discussion and a question/answer session.

The Colorado Commission for the Deaf and Hard of

Hearing is scheduled to speak at two upcoming Western Colorado HLAA meetings -- Saturday, February 5th, and Saturday, March 5th, 2011, about their Telecommunications Equipment Distribution Program (TEDP), and other services. Applications for free mobile phones will be available at these meetings.

We need at least 4 members to officially start a HLAA chapter in Western Colorado. Please join us at our next meeting, January 8th, 2011, from 10:30 am to 12:30 pm at the Center for Independence!! January's program topic will be learning to lipread, plus an open question and answer time. Free copies of HLAA's new video on hearing loss and Hearing Loss Magazine, catalogs of assistive devices, and refreshments will also be provided.

9-1-1 emergency system upgrade

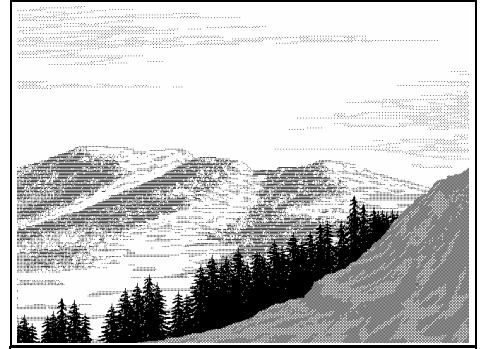

FCC has announced that it plans to upgrade the capabilities of the 9-1-1 emergency system by allowing texting, video streaming and data sharing as part of the National Broadband Plan's Next Generation 9-1-1 at <http://www.broadband.gov/issues/public-safety.html>. Many people, particularly those with disabilities, depend on texting as their primary means of communication. In some emergency situations -- especially in circumstances where a call could further jeopardize someone's life and safety -- texting is the only way to reach out for help.

A column in this morning's San Jose (Cal.) Mercury News takes another sympathetic look at the lawsuit filed last week in Oakland by the Association of Late Deafened Adults (ALDA) and two individuals against Cinermark theaters.

Author Patty Fisher recounts the frustration people with hearing loss face when trying to go to the movies. Her conclusion: with 36 million Americans having some degree of hearing loss, and that number climbing rapidly, the theaters ought to be doing whatever is required to get people away from their DVD viewers and into the theaters.

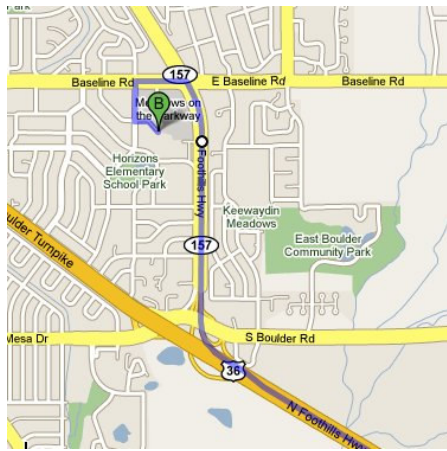
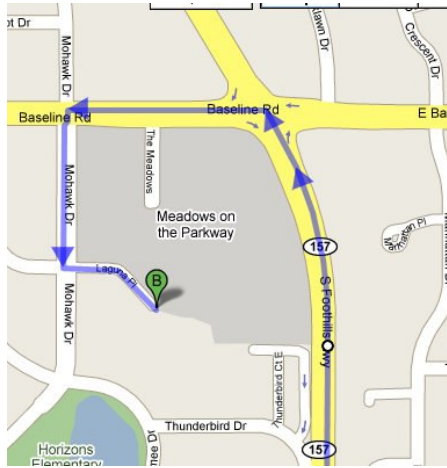

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Researchers Explore New Treatments to Silence Tinnitus

Some people hear a high-pitched buzzing sound. Others describe it as a ringing, roaring, hissing, chirping, whooshing or wheezing. It can be high or low, single or multi-toned, an occasional mild annoyance or a constant personal din. Tinnitus-whose Latin root means "to jingle"-is defined as the perception of sound when no external sound is present. It usually accompanies hearing loss, and while no one knows for sure what causes it, many experts believe that when people lose the ability to hear in certain frequencies, the brain fills the void with imaginary or remembered noise-like phantom limb pain for sound. "Those auditory centers are just craving input," says Rebecca Price, an audiologist who treats tinnitus at Duke University Health Systems in Durham, N.C. <http://tinyurl.com/25penqs> □

URGENT!!! Send Your Comments to DOJ on Movie Theater Captioning

Twenty years ago, HLAA members came out in force when it was time to comment on rules under the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). Our comments helped shape the way the rules were written. We need you to do that again to push for captioned movies.

The U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) published a notice that it is considering changes to its regulations to require movie theater owners and operators to show

captioned movies. DOJ is inviting written comments from members of the public.

If movie captions are important to you, tell the DOJ!

The DOJ proposes to require movie theater owners and operators to show films with closed captioning. DOJ proposes to limit this requirement to no more than 50 percent of the films shown, and DOJ is willing to give owners and operators up to 5 years to get to the 50 percent mark.

HLAA believes that "full and equal enjoyment" of services under the Americans with Disabilities Act means that people with hearing loss must be provided the kind of accommodations that would allow us to attend any movie anytime. For people with significant hearing loss, that means 100% captioning. We believe that an across the board industry cap of 50% is arbitrary and inconsistent with the law. HLAA's position on movie captioning is:

- All movies should be made accessible to movie goers with hearing loss though captioning.
- People with hearing loss should be able to see any movie at any time on any day.
- There are many ways to caption movies today. HLAA does not specify the method used to caption the movie so long as it provides effective communication.

DOJ is seeking comments in response to 26 questions. The entire document with all the questions can be accessed at <http://www.regulations.gov>. You can reply to some or all of the questions. We suggest at a minimum, that you respond to DOJ Question #1:

1. DOJ is proposing that the

percentage of movie screens offering closed captioning be set at 10 percent after one year and increased 10 percent a year until 50 percent is reached. Does this approach provide a proper balance between providing accessibility to consumers, on one hand, and giving owners and operators time to acquire the necessary equipment, on the other hand?

Send your comments to the DOJ today!

Comments sent by U.S. mail must be postmarked and electronic comments must be transmitted on or before **January 24, 2011**.

- State the question(s) you are responding to. You can focus all your comments on question #1 or add more.
- State why you are interested in responding. For example, that you have a hearing loss and cannot attend movies without effective closed captioning.
- State what you want to see: 100% captions, 5 years or less, no later than January 2016.
- State how lack of captions has impacted you. State why you think 100% captioning is needed.
- Thank the DOJ
- Sign your name.

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TSA Guidelines for Airport Screening the Hearing Impaired

If all of the news regarding new x-ray full body scanners and optional pat downs is confusing to those who can hear, the information can be even more

confusing to those with hearing aids.

As a result, the Transportation Security Administration (TSA) has issued the following guidelines for travelers who suffer from hearing loss or have hearing aids.

Perhaps the most relevant of the guidelines for hearing aids, the TSA states: "According to Otolaryngologist and Otolaryngology surgeons, hearing devices such as hearing aids, cochlear implants, external component of cochlear implants, and middle ear implants are not affected by X-ray inspection or walk-through metal detector screening. In addition, these devices may also safely be screened using Advanced Imaging Technology (AIT)."

If you have patients that are traveling this holiday season, you may want to inform them of the following suggestions from the TSA:

* If you need to communicate with the Security Officer, inform her/him of your disability and the way in which you can communicate. TSA Security Officers are trained to provide whatever assistance they can to persons with hearing disabilities.

* If the screening process is unclear to you, motion to the Security Officer that you can't hear and ask him/her to ask the Security Officer to write the information down.

* If you can read lips or are hard of hearing, ask the Security Officer to look directly at you and repeat the information slowly.

* It is not necessary to remove hearing aids or the exterior component of a cochlear implant at security checkpoints.

* It is best if you wear your hearing device while going through the metal detector.

* According to Otolaryngologist and Otolaryngology surgeons, hearing devices such as hearing aids, cochlear implants, external component of cochlear implants, and middle ear implants are not affected by X-ray inspection or walk-through metal detector screening. In

addition, these devices may also safely be screened using Advanced Imaging Technology (AIT).

* If you are concerned or uncomfortable with going through the walk-through metal detector, or are uneasy with having your external component of your cochlear implant X-rayed, you can ask for a full body pat-down of your person and a visual and physical inspection of the exterior component while it remains on your body.

* Assistive listening devices must undergo x-ray screening.

* If you use a hearing dog, you and the dog will remain together at all times while going through the security checkpoint. See the "Service Animal" section for more tips on service animals in the screening process.

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Lack of 3D captioning standard stymies development

As more content is being produced in 3-D, the need for captioning, now mandated by the U.S. government, has been brought to the forefront. While all of the vendors in this category are aware of the need to do it, very few customers have asked for it, which holds back development. "We certainly have the capability to produce captions in 3-D space, but we're not investing a lot in R&D until there is customer demand and a standard specification for how to do it," said José M. Salgado, president and CEO of Los Angeles-based SoftNI, a veteran captioning and subtitling software provider. To be clear, the issue has to do with closed-captioning, not necessarily "subtitling." 3-D subtitling is typically predetermined by the content producer and is inserted into a plane (below, on the side or on top of the screen) that's most aesthetically pleasing to the eye. Because subtitles are simply a part of the picture, there is no need for new technology to transmit or display them.

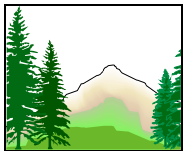
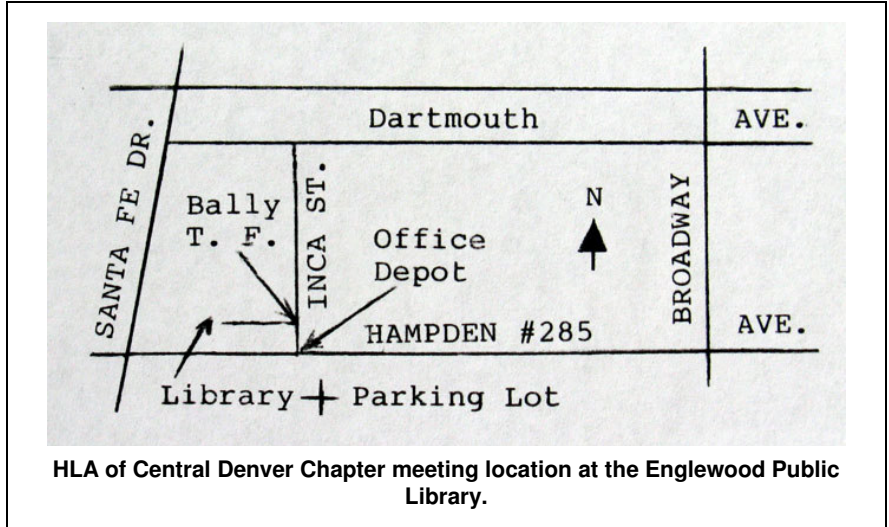

Turn left on to S. Inca St.

Turn left where the Bally store is and continue to go into the parking garage to park. The library is on the right next to the garage.

From Dartmouth Avenue:
Turn left from the East or turn right from the West into S. Inca St. at the northern end.

Continue south on S. Inca St. Turn right where the Bally store is, and continue into the parking garage. Library is to the right.
